rewarding to be with those who have and continue to journey with us in this very special model of ministry.



Labyrinth Fund-Raising Status

As of Sunday, Sept. 19, we have *received a total of \$3610.00*. Thank you to everyone who has donated to help complete this wonderful project. The loan balance due to our Pearson Fund is \$2290.00. These numbers are only relative to the chart in the narthex that represents the donations since the completion of the patio/labyrinth in June and not the total donations. We have actually collected \$11,580.00 for the labyrinth construction.

So, we have **\$2,290.00 to go** before next June when we committed to repay the money we borrowed from our Pearson fund so we could complete the project. Any additional appreciation or memorial gifts will be greatly appreciated. **Jim Neal**
