I do hope and pray that St. Hugh provides an environment that helps each of us find peace - peace with God through worship, study and service; peace in our hearts as we grow in relationship with others; peace in our minds as we reflect on our lives and our relationship with God.

Peace, what is peace and how do we find it?

A recent discussion presented the thought that peace was the absence of fear: fear of financial struggle, fear of health concerns or fear of broken relationships.

Financial peace:

In our consumer society we can easily be trapped by the misconception that "things" bring us peace. But, when do we have enough? It is said that money

does not bring happiness; but it sure helps. That is certainly true because wealth enables us to provide shelter, food and security for our loved ones, but once we have those things, are we then at peace? Maybe; Maybe not.

Wellness peace:

Each of us and each of our loved ones will have times of health issues, big or small. If we let these times distance us from God and others it disables the healing link available through prayer, meditation and reflection. Healing prayers do work! Peace can be a wonderful, healing power when we allow God to be present during our times of deepest need.

Relationship peace:

Tell me a time when each of us didn't have broken relationships in our lives: family members, friends or neighbors. Maybe the relationship with God is the only relationship that is ever present. God never turns away from us.

I believe that it is not how much we have (wealth, health or friends) that matters, but what we do with what we do have. My maternal grandmother lived on limited financial means in an old house in a small town. My mother lived on social security, in an apartment, severely crippled with arthritis. Both of

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these women were the most peace-full persons I have ever known. I continue to learn from their example.

I recently read that the purpose of a church is to bring people closer to God. ***Being close to God***; that is the focus of a peace-full life that I hope we can each nurture and appreciate.

It is this closeness to God that brings peace into my life. I sense this closeness in nature. We recently went on a hike at Staircase in the Olympic National Park. What a beautiful and peace-full place. I sense a closeness to God on Sunday mornings when I sit in the sanctuary before our worship and spend quiet time with God. I sense a closeness to God during our worship when we share scripture, reflections and prayer. I feel an intimate relationship with God during the Eucharist and I feel a closeness to God when I am with my friends at St. Hugh.

I believe that St. Hugh is a special place for me where I find God and can focus on building a closer relationship with Jesus. The central objective of our landscape project is to make the gardens at St. Hugh as peace full as the sanctuary and the people who worship here. I pray that the sign at our entrance has special meaning to you and gives you peace. Amen

Come and join us as we begin a new chapter in our story of Baptismal commitment as a Total Common Ministry. New Circle Formation fall classes begin September 15th, at 1:30 pm in the sanctuary. Our texts will be LISTENING HEARTS, Discerning Call in Community and GROUNDED IN GOD, Listening Hearts Discernment for Group Deliberations.

Both books are very readable, thought provoking and available through the church. The group study will be facilitated by members of St. Hugh’s Leadership Circle As a Total Common Ministry, based on our

Baptismal Covenant, the St Hugh congregation has embarked on and completed two leadership formation processes over the past few years. Each has resulted in the discernment of congregational ministries and the call of a circle of individuals to commission and ordination for these ministries. It has now been six years since we completed the last formation and commissioning process. Many of our members have joined the St Hugh family since then and have not had the opportunity to experience this process, even though many have become deeply involved in a variety of vital ministries. The formation process begins with a study and discernment of the gifts that are necessary for the ministries through which St Hugh serves and is served in this community. It is time to consider how we will incorporate the gifts, skills and energy of these newer folks into formation and the leadership circle; time to begin a third tier of spiritual formation for leadership at St. Hugh. Notes

Utilities: Power continues to be over budget due to heating system problems during 1st Qtr.

Property Maintenance: All categories are under budget. Donations for yard maintenance continue and normal expenses have decreased. Junior Warden says there have been very few building issues this year other than heating which was funded by the Bud Welch fund and private donations.

Administrative: Payroll paid in December rather than January and Office Supplies less than anticipated for 2009 contribute to significant under run.

Advertising and Outreach: Timing of payments versus consistent budget probably contributes to variances.

Clergy/Lay Leadership: Diocesan convention expenses will begin next month.

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that in mind we will begin with this in depth study of the discernment process.

Many have heard this term bandied about but are confused or unclear about what we mean by discernment, and how it works. The word "*Discernment comes from the Latin word discernere, which means 'to separate,' 'to distinguish,' 'to determine,' 'to sort out.'*" *In classical spirituality, discernment means identifying what spirit is at work in a situation: the Spirit of God, or some other spirit."* It is 'sifting through' our interior and exterior experiences to determine their origin. Discernment helps a person understand the source of a call, to whom it is directed, its content and if the response is appropriate." *Listening Hearts, pg 23.* When used in the group decision making process it is a way to insure each member has a voice and the opportunity to express their thoughts, feelings and concerns, allowing Spirit to work through the group in revealing the best possible resolution of an issue or the best answers to questions before the body.

Understanding and becoming skilled in the use of discernment is the first and crucial step to the work of spiritual formation. It is a different way of thinking and decision making with which most of us are familiar. Even those of us who have been through the training and involved in leading discernment will need to refresh our understanding and skill in the process, while others come to understand its value and trust its results. *May the Holy Spirit of Wisdom and Love guide and direct us as we endeavor to do the work God has given us to do in growing the Body of Christ in our lives and in our community. Amen.*

Come and Enjoy Our Labyrinth

As you have no doubt noticed, our temporary rope labyrinth is now ready for walking. Here is the place for you to direct the feet, settle the mind and center the soul. We are experimenting with a 7-circuit labyrinth (there are 7 concentric circles from which the paths are formed). After walking and discussing labyrinths from 3 circuits to 11 circuits, we liked the wider paths of the 7-circuit and the more gentle turns. What do you think?

Our next steps are to make a final decision on the labyrinth style and surrounding patio, and to begin fund raising for the approximately \$9,000 we will need to finish the project. This cost includes both the labyrinth and the patio which will surround it. All donors will be recognized on a permanent plaque. Benediction: A blessing pronounced by a bishop or priest at the conclusion of a worship service. In a general sense, it may refer to any prayer that closes a meeting or gathering.

The Peace: A liturgical exchange of greeting through word and gesture. It is a sign of reconciliation, love, and renewed relationships in the Christian community. It is initiated by the celebrant, who says, "the peace of the Lord be always with you." The people respond, "And also with you." The ministers and people may greet one another in the name of the Lord. Any appropriate words of greeting may be used in the exchange of peace that follows between individuals. The gesture of greeting has been expressed in a variety of ways, including a kiss on the cheek, an embrace, a handclasp, or a bow. The peace is also known as the kiss of peace and the Pax (from the Latin, "peace").

Christie, Garby, & The Very Rev. Victor Atta-Baffoe, Canon for Education and Dean of St Nicholas Seminary in the Diocese of Cape Coast, Ghana.

Bishop Rickle invited Victor to visit the Diocese of Olympia following the General Convention in July. St Mark's in Montesano hosted an evening of sharing and conversation where Victor and 12 of us from St Marks and St Hugh, shared a light supper and exchanged questions and answers about our work and our churches. Bishop Baffoe shared about his work in the seminary in Africa where he has been actively involved in getting women into the seminary and ordained. It was very interesting to hear about his work, about the culture and faith of the Anglican people in Ghana, and

his perspective as a participant in the conversations around Windsor Report of the Anglican Communion. He was very interested in Total Common Ministry and how the model is working in our congregations. We discovered that even though our cultures are quite different and their churches are much more "high church" than this diocese, our congregations aren't all that different from those in Africa. It was interesting to hear about the openness and progressive thinking of our Anglican brothers and sisters in Ghana. We found Victor to be very warm, wise and forward thinking and thoroughly enjoyed our evening with him. It is our intention to maintain the connection that has been made. We're also very grateful to St. Mark's for offering us this opportunity to share with this brother from another culture and place in the world, who reminded us that we truly are all one in the body of Christ. He left us with this thought, "I am – we are - for me to be me we must be one." Amen.

**Project Healing Waters:
A program that heals in many ways.**

Here at St Hugh, we are reminded each week during the prayers of the people, of those in the military service who are in harm's way. So far, none on our prayer list have become casualties, but what we don't know are the effects of just being in harm's way: of being shot at, or being 'blown up', a term our modern GIs use to describe being even remotely close to an exploding IED.

Spc. Bret DiFrancesco of the Warrior Transition Brigade (WTB) at Fort Lewis stated his thoughts on this: "When you get shot at, you get mad," he said. "When you get blown up, it's a surprise." But the surprise part is what seems to make coping a difficult thing, and the suicide prevention posters in the day room of the WTB barracks are there for obvious reasons. Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is real, and needs to be addressed.

Enter a program first introduced at Walter Reed VA Hospital in 2007 called Project Healing Waters Fly

Fishing, Inc. Dedicated to the physical and emotional rehabilitation of disabled active duty military personnel and veterans through fly fishing education and outings; it has spread throughout the US, and has been readily adopted as worthy projects for fly fishing organizations.

Several such organizations in the Puget Sound Area have donated materials, equipment, and time to make this program an effective way to get these heroes out of their funk and onto local lakes and streams to fly fish. For many, it starts with learning to tie a fly, to cast it, and then to hook and land, in many cases, their very first fish.

And when I said in the title to this piece that this program heals in many ways, the instructors, many of which are combat veterans themselves, have been known to show a few tears when their student lands that first fish.

Dick has been devoted to this wonderful program helping vets and soldiers for over 2 years at Fort Lewis – is also now involved in helping in a similar program at the Veterans Hospital in Seattle,. His admirable outreach is appreciated by us all. Good work, Dick.

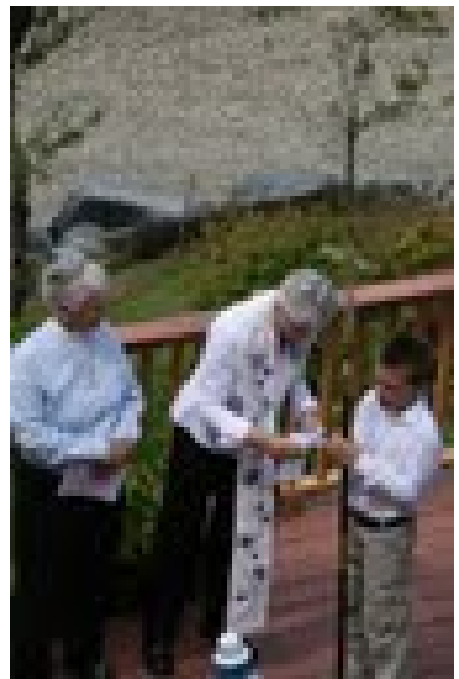
